George Washington First Inauguration Day Map Activity

Trace Washington's footsteps to the Inauguration. You will need:

- A pencil
- Green highlighter
- Yellow highlighter
- Map Markers on p.2

- Glue stick
- Map of New York City from your Teacher

Directions:

- 1. Some things on the map did not exist in 1789. They had not been built! Put a small "X" on the following things:
 - a. Brooklyn Bridge
 - b. World Financial Center
 - c. World Trade Center Site
 - d. City Hall Park
 - e. Statue of Liberty (George Washington never saw the Statue of Liberty!)
- 2. George Washington arrived in New York by boat. He landed at the foot of Wall Street. Glue the <u>anchor</u> at the port at Wall Street.
- 3. George Washington then walked to his new home at 3 Cherry Street. Cherry Street is not on the map! Follow the instructions and draw Cherry Street on the map.
 - a. Cherry Street begins at the intersection of Pearl St. and Frankfort St.
 - b. Cherry St. goes under the Brooklyn Bridge.
 - c. Cherry Street runs east and west.
 - d. Cherry Street runs parallel with South St./F.D.R. Drive
 - e. On your map, Cherry St. will end in the top right hand corner.
- 4. Using your <u>green highlighter</u>, mark the route Washington took to arrive at his new home:
 - a. Begin at Wall St. port on South Street/F.D.R. Drive.
 - b. Turn right on Water St. Water St. will merge with Pearl St.
 - Continue walking northeast on Pearl St. to the intersection of Frankfort St. and Cherry St.
 - d. You have arrived at George Washington's home in New York. Glue your <u>star</u> here.

- 5. On April 30, 1789 was Inauguration Day. He traveled to Federal Hall in a yellow coach. Use your <u>yellow highlighter</u> to mark his route from his home to Federal Hall.
 - a. George Washington left his home on Cherry St and traveled southwest on Pearl St to Wall St.
 - b. Washington turned right on Wall Street and stopped at Federal Hall. Glue the <u>hat</u> beside Federal Hall.

Short Answer:

- 1. After the Inauguration, George Washington led Congress to St. Paul's Chapel where he prayed for America. What two possible routes could he have taken?
- 2. Distance. Using the key on the map, estimate how many feet between Federal Hall and St. Paul's Chapel.
- 3. How many total feet did George Washington travel on April 30, 1789?
